
## The Chess Treasures of CABA - an expedition to a most interesting chess historical place

CABA = Ciudad Autónoma de Buenos Aires, which chess addict would not be thrilled by the opportunity to visit this most important place of great chess events? The years 1927, 1939, 1953 (Reshevsky – Najdorf), 1960, 1971 (Fischer – Petrosian), 1978, 1980 (Korchnoi – Polugaevsky) are all connected with "Good Airs", and also names like Lasker, Capablanca, Alekhine, Euwe, Smyslov, Tal, Petrosian, Spassky, Fischer, Larsen, Karpov, Kasparov etc.

So I was most happy, when it became obvious, that a business trip to Argentina could be combined with a visit to the famous <u>CLUB ARGENTINO DE AJEDREZ</u>. By chance, nearly ten years ago I met Juan Sebástian Morgado for the first time personally in Brunswick during the foundation assembly of the Ken Whyld Association. So it was also a good opportunity to meet that long-term chess friend again.

Juan was friendly enough to arrange a contact with Dr. Claudio Javier Gonçalves, the "presidente" of the chess club, but also a prominent organizer and official in Correspondence Chess.

Arriving early on Saturday morning from Madrid, I met Juan in my hotel in Ricoleta quarter in the late afternoon.





Licenciado en psicología, Juan Sebastián Morgado dedica todos sus esfuerzos al ajedrez, el que constituye sin duda la verdadera vocación de su vida.

Su actividad particular está relacionada con su propia librería ajedrecística, y en ese sentido también cabe destacar el aporte de su revista "Ajedrez de Estilo", continuadora de la tradición de otras grandes publicaciones argentinas del pasado.





Morgado es editor de una extensa serie de publicaciones sobre la teoría del juego y otra muy reciente, sobre los éxitos deportivos de los grandes maestros actuales.

Aunque sus absorbentes obligaciones le impiden dedicarse a los torneos "de cuerpo presente", en cambio demuestra su interés por otras actividades, como la enseñanza, el ajedrez postal y los certámenes internacionales de Estudios, y en este aspecto organizó y difundió con su revista el "Concurso José Mugnos In Memoriam" (1988-91), que tuvo una extraordinaria repercusión a nivel mundial.
